DISTRICT 8 COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY

On September 29, 2001, Fred Groth and Carl Sutter attended the District 8 Council Meeting in Davenport, Iowa. Attendees included Zone III Vice President Dennis Martenson, District 8 Director Nick Textor, Zone III Administrator Michael Cook and representatives of each Section within District 8 (except the North Dakota Section). Highlights of topics discussed are as follows:

1. *District Director Rotation Plan: A revision to the current rotation plan is being considered, however, any revision would require a change in the bylaws. An action plan schedule to implement a change in the bylaws by April 2002 was established.*
2. *Director Textor wants to visit each Section two times per year.*
3. *Governance Proposal: The proposed new Governance was outlined and dominated the agenda and discussion, however, the proposal was tabled by National Board of Direction action in October prior to the ASCE National Annual Meeting in Houston. A subcommittee of the Board of Direction was appointed to rework the proposed restructuring of the Society's governance.*
4. *150th Anniversary: There was a general discussion of each Section's plans. ASCE's 150th Anniversary National Student Conference will be held June 20-24, 2002, at UW-Madison (see Article p. 4).*
5. *The Wisconsin Section will host the Fall 2002 District 8 Council Meeting.*

150th National Student Convention – 2002

ASCE's 150th Anniversary National Student Conference will be held June 20-24, 2002, at the University of Wisconsin – Madison. This event is a great opportunity for Civil Engineering students, faculty, and professionals to enjoy the Madison area while learning through the many activities offered including two national competitions, community service, leadership, career opportunities, and education. Over 1500 participants are expected to register, creating the opportunity for other universities and professionals to participate in coordinating the conference. UW-Platteville, Marquette University, MSOE, UW-Milwaukee, and the Wisconsin Section of ASCE are currently working together with UW-Madison to plan this first-of-a-kind conference.

The two major national events of the conference are the Concrete Canoe and Steel Bridge Competitions held at the Memorial Union Terrace and Kohl Center Arena respectively. Both

competitions include aesthetic judging, oral presentations, and races. Additional activities include a Career Fair, Lecture Series, Field Trips and a Service Project, in addition to the competitions and other planned recreational activities. The Career Fair expects to bring in over 100 nation-wide employers and manufacturers in the Civil Engineering profession to help students find internships, co-ops, and full-time employment. The Lecture Series has grown to include Resume and Interviewing Skills, Faculty Advisor Sessions, Focus Session on Fundraising, Community Service, Motivating Student Members, and the History and Heritage of ASCE. Field Trips will be provided to the Overture Project, Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District, Milwaukee's Miller Park Stadium, and Milwaukee Art Center. The Service Project, in conjunction with Project H.O.M.E., will work to have a positive impact on Madison by conducting a Paint-a-Thon over two days. Finally, a variety of competitions conducted not only by UW-Madison, but also schools

from California, Colorado, and others will provide fun activities throughout the day.

The project management team has completed many of the original goals for the planning process by providing information and raising funds for the conference; however, there is still a significant amount of planning to complete the conference successfully. Three notifications to student chapters across the country have already been sent, with three more notifications planned. **Our web site at www.wisc.edu/~asce150 is the main source of information for the conference.** The budget for the entire conference is currently estimated at approximately \$750,000 including a fundraising goal for UW-Madison of \$75,000. - The **YOUNGER MEMBER GROUP AWARD** recognizes the most outstanding large and small Younger Member Groups in the Society.
- The **COLLINGWOOD PRIZE** is awarded to the author(s) of a paper (1) describing an engineering work with which the author(s) have been directly connected or (2) recording the investigations contributing to engineering knowledge to which the author(s) have contributed some essential part, and (3) containing a rational digest of results.

2002 DANIEL W. MEAD CONTEST FOR YOUNGER MEMBERS

The Daniel W. Mead Prize for Younger Members was established in 1939 to honor the memory and accomplishments of the 67th President of the American Society of Civil Engineers. The talents of many of the leaders of the profession were first recognized in previous contests for this significant professional honor. The current contest provides another opportunity for alert young civil engineers to further their professional development and gain national attention.

In recognition of the 150th Anniversary of ASCE (1852-2002), the Society is both celebrating its history and looking forward to its future. This year's Mead topic invites you to discuss the impact of ethics on the civil engineering profession in this context.

The paper must be written on:

"Ethics and Civil Engineering: Past, Present and Future"

Points to ponder:

- What ethical challenges will face Civil Engineers 50 years from now?
- Given the technological advances of the last 150 years, how will technology influence civil engineering ethics in the future?

RULES

- ◆ The author must be an Associate Member, Member or Affiliate of the Society, 35 years of age or less on February 1, 2002.
- ◆ Only one person can write each paper.
- ◆ Each Section or Branch can submit only one paper.
- ◆ Paper must contain no more than 2,000 words and must address professional ethics.
- ◆ One winner may be selected from each of the four Zones and International membership of the Society.
- ◆ The national winner, selected from the Zonal winners, will receive a wall plaque and a certificate.
- ◆ The national winner may be invited to present his/her paper at the ASCE National Convention, Washington, D.C., in November 2002.
- ◆ The paper by the national winner will be submitted for publication in **Civil Engineering**.

BOARD OF DIRECTION APPROVES ACADEMIC PREREQUISITES FOR LICENSURE AND PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

At their meeting of October 9, 2001, the National ASCE Board of Direction approved the following Policy.

The American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) supports the concept of the Master's Degree or Equivalent as a prerequisite for licensure and the practice of civil engineering at a professional level. ASCE encourages institutions of higher education, governmental units, employers, civil engineers, and other appropriate organizations to endorse, support, and promote the concept of mandatory post-baccalaureate education for the practice of civil engineering at a professional level. The implementation of this effort should occur through establishing appropriate curricula in the formal education experience, appropriate recognition and compensation in the workplace, and congruent standards for licensure.

The issue and rationale of the Board of Direction are detailed in ASCE Policy Statement 465. For details contact any Section Board member or ASCE's Web Site.

Engineer Alert Regarding Unusual Requests for Plans

In the wake of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks the following security measure has been recommended for all agencies and firms that routinely deal with building plans.

A number of firms from the design and engineering community have reported recent or past requests for building plans that, in light of the attacks of September 11, 2001, appear unusual due to the structures identified in the requests or the type of information solicited. The American Institute of Architects and the National Society of Professional Engineers, in conjunction with the U.S. General Services Administration, are coordinating with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to provide design firms with information on this situation.

It's never too early to begin thinking about the annual ASCE Wisconsin Section Awards Competition. There are several different awards under the ASCE umbrella, and they include:

- ❖ Individual Merit Awards
- ❖ Distinguished Service Awards
 - *Engineer in Education*
 - *Engineer in Consulting Practice*
 - *Engineer in Government Service*
 - *Engineer in Private Practice (Utility, Industry, etc.)*
- ❖ Excellence in Journalism Award
- ❖ Young Civil Engineer of the Year Award (nominee must be less than 35 years of age during 2002)
- ❖ Engineering Achievement Awards

Although the award nominations are not due to the section secretary, John Burgan until June 1, 2002, now is the best time to inform your co-workers, and/or business associates about the program and select your projects.

The Engineering Excellence Awards portion of the competition recognizes civil engineering achievements located in the Wisconsin Section's geographical area. The determining factor in categorizing entries is construction cost.

- Category A: Construction cost under \$2,000,000
- Category B: Construction cost over \$2,000,000 and under \$10,000,000
- Category C: Construction cost over \$10,000,000 and under \$20,000,000
- Category D: Construction cost over \$20,000,000

Awards are made by the Board of Directors, based on the recommendation of a selected Jury of Judges. A particular project, regardless of category or size, may then be designated the Wisconsin Section ASCE Outstanding Civil Engineering Achievement of the Year. In addition, all award winners will be asked to provide a poster for display at the Annual Meeting held each September, and will be given the opportunity to provide a presentation for use at the noon luncheon awards ceremony.

Unlike many other awards' competitions, there is no fee for entering the ASCE awards program. We are simply looking for people and projects that demonstrate excellence in engineering skills, and represents a significant contribution to engineering progress and society.
